CONFERENCES/MEETINGS/PRESENTATIONS

IOOS Spring Meeting – Molly joined her IOOS colleagues in Washington DC March 4-5 for the annual spring meeting between the IOOS Program Office and the Regional Associations. Day 1 focused on discussions on Converging Opportunities (UN Decade for Ocean Science, IOOS Grand Challenges and Decadal Vision for Ocean Science and Technology); National Ocean Services Opportunities (Nicole LeBeouf and Mark Osler); Opportunities for Observing Biology; Regional Ocean Projects update, and IOOS Program Updates. Molly was also able to check in with the Alaska delegation offices to keep them updated on AOOS activities.

2020 Alaska Coastal Mapping Summit – The summit was previously scheduled for April 9th in Anchorage and has now been postponed until later this year. Currently, we are targeting to coincide the Summit with this fall's Alaska Mapping Executive Committee (AMEC) meeting if it is held in Alaska.

COLLABORATIONS

Alaska OA Network – OA researchers are in the process of figuring out what research and monitoring will take place this summer and what will be postponed. They will be providing updates within the OA community via Zoom on April 3.

Coastal Mapping Strategy for Alaska - The November 2019 presidential [Memorandum on Ocean and Coastal Mapping](#) called for NOAA, the State of Alaska, and AMEC to draft a coastal mapping strategy for Alaska. With AOOS assistance, the draft is complete and is currently under review by the Office of Science and Technology Policy. Document release is anticipated in June of this year.
